
Addressing School Concerns

As a parent or caregiver we take on many roles, and one of them is advocate for our children. When we are concerned about something that is happening to our child in their school or classroom we can use the <u>Parent Concern Protocol</u>, <u>PR505</u>. The protocol is a process that allows parents and caregivers the ability to express their concerns and advocate for their child at the board in a formal and recorded manner.

The communication protocol starts with bringing your classroom concern to the teacher. If you feel the concern was not resolved, you may then bring it to your principal. If that doesn't resolve the issue, you may next communicate to the Superintendent and if still unresolved, to the Trustee.

PIAC was involved in the creation of the Parent Concern Protocol, demonstrating another important way PIAC represents the voice of parents in the TDSB.
